

- eliminating the discrepancies in attainment at 'district' level



The role of the governing body

Governing Bodies have a crucial role in ensuring school improvement.

Well organised and effective Governing Bodies have a strong focus on three core strategic functions:

- ensuring clarity of vision, ethos and strategic direction
- holding the leadership to account for the educational performance of the school and its children and
- overseeing the financial performance of the school and making sure that money is well spent.

A clear strand of the strategy is to promote high quality training, support and challenge for school governance.



High quality schools

School Leadership

- Strong and sustainable leadership is vital
- Support and development and guidance available through refreshed Lead in Herts programme
- The aim is to enable a school led improvement system to flourish



High quality schools

Teaching and Learning

- High quality teaching and learning is at the heart of ensuring that children achieve their full potential
- Importance of comprehensive career development programme to ensure teachers can deliver high quality teaching required for effective learning
- Herts for Learning working with teaching school alliances and school leaders to shape and deliver the programme



The role of the parent



- The strategy acknowledges the important part parents play in ensuring good outcomes for children
- It builds on the excellent parental engagement programmes already taking place in many schools
- HfL is investing in a new evidence based programme that promotes and develops skills from parent to parent
- The LA recognises the importance of family focused intervention support across Children's Services.







DfE – Schools Causing Concern

Statutory guidance for local authorities – published May 2014

- legislative requirements for intervention in maintained schools
- guidance on the use of warning notices and IEBs (Interim Executive Boards)
- *"Local Authorities should raise any concerns they have about an academy's performance directly with the Department of Education".*
- "Local Authority responsibilities for Special Educational Needs and Safeguarding of pupils continue to apply in respect of academies"









Regional Schools Commissioners

Supported by local headteacher boards....



- monitoring performance and intervening to secure improvement in underperforming academies
- taking decisions on the creation of new academies
- supporting the national schools' commissioner to ensure sponsor market meets local need





Labour's policy review - just published

- additional autonomy to all schools and creation of Community Trusts to bring together small primary schools not already a part of a partnership
- new independent post Director of School Standards – appointed locally and locally accountable
- Inspection of 14+ "alternative provision" to make sure young people do not become NEET (Not in Education, Employment or Training)







- re-establishing the National College for School Leadership
- kitemarking of educational support services including sponsor chains – brought within a standard framework
- public duty of the Local Authority to represent the interests of pupils and parents
- greater support for governance
- abolition of the role of Regional School Commissioners (!)
